Applications should ideally be received by 23 June 2014, but will be considered on a rolling basis until the positions are filled.

TEL Editorial positions offer extensive editorial experience in the burgeoning field of transnational environmental law, the opportunity to work with a dynamic international team of environmental legal scholars and professionals, the title of editor, complimentary subscription to TEL, and some benefits in kind. TEL editorial positions are unremunerated.

Overview of roles and requirements

1) TEL Book Review Editors are responsible for:

- selecting new books for review;
- identifying and contacting book reviewers;
- · agreeing and managing deadlines for the submission of reviews;
- copy-editing submitted reviews;
- offering feedback to book reviewers; and
- liaising with the TEL Editors-in-Chief on the issues above

Book Review Editorship is a position that is particularly well suited to early career academics with ideally a few years of professional experience. A legal background and a thorough command of English are essential; having editorial experience and research interests in environmental law are highly desirable.

2) TEL Assistant Editors are responsible for:

- performing quick-scan reviews for newly received manuscripts and making recommendations to the Editors-in-Chief on whether submissions are ready for double-blind peer review;
- recommending suitable peer reviewers;
- checking whether revised submissions respond to peer review and editorial feedback;
- performing 'first cut' content editing of accepted manuscripts; and
- liaising with the TEL Editors-in-Chief on the issues above

Assistant Editorship is a position that is particularly well suited to early career academics with ideally a few years of professional experience. Depending on experience, the position may also suit post-graduate researchers versed in environmental law. A background in environmental law and a thorough command of English are essential; having editorial experience is highly desirable.

3) TEL Editorial Assistants are responsible for various tasks including:

- copy-editing accepted manuscripts in accordance with the TEL house style;
- liaising with authors, reviewers and the TEL Editors-in-Chief on queries arising in the editorial process;
- posting news items on TEL social media (Twitter, Facebook, LinkedIn);
- assisting *TEL* Editors-in-Chief with other (social media) outreach initiatives.

Editorial assistantship is particularly well suited to post-graduate researchers or, depending on experience, graduate students. Having a thorough command of English is essential. Familiarity with social media, a legal background and an interest in environmental law are highly desirable.

CALL FOR SUBMISSIONS

The Editors invite online submissions of manuscripts for publication in *Transnational Environmental Law* via *TEL*'s ScholarOne online submissions and review platform:

Before submitting their work online, prospective authors are strongly urged to refer to the instructions for manuscript preparation (including house style, referencing format, and additional guidance). For detailed submission instructions, see:

All contributions in the journal are double-blind peer-reviewed. All manuscripts must entail original, previously unpublished work, and should not be under consideration for publication elsewhere. The Editors will also consider revised versions of previously released working papers, provided that such publication is clearly acknowledged upon submission of the paper for consideration to *TEL*.

TEL strives to respect an expedient turn-around time of 6 – 8 weeks between receipt of the manuscript and first notification of acceptance, rejection or need for revision.

The length of manuscripts should normally range between 8,000 and 11,000 words (including footnotes) for full-length articles; 3,000 - 6,000 words for commentaries and case notes; and 800 - 1,500 words for book reviews. Exceptionally, shorter or longer works may be considered at the Editors' discretion.
